The EMS Board is in the process of amending regulations to change the nomenclature for emergency medical services (EMS) providers' licensure and certification levels to reflect national standards. These changes were made to the EMS provider law during the last legislative session and become effective by July 2012.

Specifically:

- First Responder will be changed to Emergency Medical Responder.
- Emergency Medical Technician-Basic will be changed to EMT.
- Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic will be changed to Paramedic.

Two other existing levels, Cardiac Rescue Technicians and Emergency Medical Dispatchers, will remain the same.

In Memoriam; Rick Meighen, MIEMSS Region II Administrator

Richard C. Meighen, passed from this life on Tuesday, February 7, 2012 at the University of Maryland Medical Center following complications from a Bone Marrow Transplant.

Rick started his career in 1977 as a Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technician and Paramedic in Moundsville, West Virginia. In 1983, he moved to Washington, DC and was employed as a Paramedic by the District of Columbia Fire Department until 1993. Rick continued his education at the University of Maryland Baltimore County, graduating with a degree in Emergency Health Services Administration. He then took employment in 1994 with the Maryland Institute for Emergency Medical Services Systems, working as an Assistant Administrator in Region V and in 2004 became the Region II Administrator for Frederick and Washington counties.

He is survived by his wife of 28 years Jamie; his son Andrew, and his daughter Jenna; one brother, Tim Meighen and his wife Roberta, of St. Clairsville, Ohio; his mother in law, Judy Purtiman of McMechen, WV; three sisters-in-law, Rea Leoni of Weirton, West Virginia, Tonya Tribett and her husband Mike of McMechen, West Virginia, and Tammy Marsh and her husband Ron of Fort Bragg, North Carolina; and one brother-in-law, James Purtiman and his wife Lea of Leesville, Louisiana. MARYLAND'S STARS OF LIFE AWARDS

Each year the Maryland Institute for Emergency Medical Services Systems celebrates EMS Week by honoring men and women across Maryland who have contributed to the EMS system. We use the term "Stars of Life" because it combines our symbol, the star of life, with our shared vision, "the elimination of preventable death and disability from injury or sudden illness." This year we are again opening the award nomination process to everyone who receives the Maryland EMS News. Awardees will be selected by a statewide committee of career, volunteer, and commercial EMS providers. For further information, call 410-706-3994.

The categories of Maryland Star of Life, Maryland EMS Citizen, EMS Provider of the Year, and EMD Provider of the Year relate to specific incidents occurring from January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011. Multiple awards may be presented.

MARYLAND STAR OF LIFE AWARD

This award may be given to an individual, multiple individuals, or teams on the same incident for an outstanding rescue by EMS personnel.

MARYLAND EMS CITIZEN AWARD

This award is intended for citizen rescuers who have demonstrated quick thinking, fast action, and heroism.

EMS PROVIDER OF THE YEAR

For a provider who has made outstanding contributions in the past year to the continuous improvement of emergency medical services in Maryland (for example, in the areas of quality assurance; public or EMS education; prevention; delivery of EMS services; new technology).

EMD PROVIDER OF THE YEAR

This award is given for extraordinary efforts in assisting the public in this vital portion of the Chain of Survival.

OUTSTANDING EMS PROGRAM

For a program that offers an innovative approach to reducing death and disability. The program must be affiliated with an EMS system component, such as a hospital, educational facility, rescue squad, or EMS organization.

LEON W. HAYES AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN EMS

This award is given to an individual who demonstrates through his/her professional and personal life, dedication to excellence in patient care, compassion and respect for each patient, and commitment to continuous improvement of the Maryland EMS system in education and in prevention.

MARYLAND EMS-CHILDREN (EMS-C) AWARD

This award is given for an adult or program that has demonstrated ongoing dedication and commitment to improving the care for children and for promoting Family Centered Care in a Maryland EMS program or hospital.

MARYLAND EMS-GERIATRIC (EMS-G) AWARD

This award is given for an individual or program that has demonstrated ongoing dedication and commitment to improving the EMS care of the elderly in Maryland.

The Right Care When It Counts Maryland EMSC 2012 Program



The Maryland EMS for Children program is <u>In Search Of</u> children and youth in Maryland who have demonstrated one of the 10 Steps to Take in an Emergency or one of the 10 Ways to be Better Prepared for an Emergency. Actions taking place January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011 are eligible for nomination. We will be recognizing children and youth who acted so that others would receive "The Right Care When It Counts." Each nominee will receive a patch and certificate and be eligible for a state award at a ceremony during EMS Week 2012.

Ten ways to be better prepared if your child has an Emergency:

- 1. Check if 9-1-1 is the right number to call
- 2. Keep a well-stocked First Aid Kit on hand
- 3. Make a list of Emergency Phone Numbers
- 4. Teach your children whom to call and what to say
- 5. Make sure your house number is visible from the street
- 6. Keep a clear and up-to-date record of immunizations
- 7. Write down medical conditions, medications, and dosages
- 8. Make a list of allergies and reactions
- 9. If you have health insurance, check your emergency coverage
- 10. Take first aid classes

Ten steps to take in an Emergency:

- 1. Call 9-1-1 immediately
- 2. Call Poison Control immediately
- 3. If you think your child has been seriously injured, do not move your child
- 4. Know how to treat your child in case of a burn
- 5. Be prepared if your child has a seizure
- 6. Know what to do if your child is bleeding
- 7. Know how to help a child with a broken bone
- 8. Do not administer the Heimlich maneuver or CPR unless you are trained
- 9. Have your emergency plan on hand
- 10. Make it easy for emergency personnel to find you

electronic Maryland EMS Data System (eMEDS)

electronic Maryland EMS Data System (eMEDS), the State electronic EMS data collection program, implementation continues statewide, for both public safety and commercial services. Region I has successfully moved from eMAIS to eMEDS. Washington County in Region II has also switched to eMEDS. All of Region III will be migrating to eMEDS, with Anne Arundel County and Baltimore County going live in mid to late February. Several Commercial Services have begun the implementation process, with Maryland ExpressCare and the Erickson Communities currently live. Several Federal Operational Programs have also started to migrate over to eMEDS, Aberdeen Proving Ground, and NSA Bethesda Naval District, with Camp David and Fort Detrick in the planning stages. MIEMSS continues to validate data imports from third party vendors, and has successfully imported data into eMEDS from a third party vendor. CAD linkages have now been established in two counties, with several in the process for implementation. Howard County is in testing phase right now, and Prince George's County plans to migrate over in March 2012, along with Kent, Calvert, and St. Mary's Counties. MIEMSS will also be establishing a CAD linkage between the new

Maryland State Police Aviation Command (MSPAC) Flight Vector Software to enable EMS information to be imported directly into MSP Aviation eMEDS.


